

This lens embraces angles of pictures from 100° to 100°, and enables photographers to take views of buildings, interiors, &c., in confined situations, where lenses of longer focus cannot be used, and where absolute rectitude of lines is imperative.

The wide-angle Rectilinear Lens has the following advantages over existing non-distorting doublecombination lenses:—It is entirely free from a cen-

tral spot. It can be used with a larger stop, i.e., it is quicker in action. It produces a more brilliant picture. The lenses of which it is composed are smaller and thinner, for a given sized plate, than those of other lenses intended for the same size of picture.



This lens is constructed to embrace angles of pictures from 60° to 80°. It admits of being used with the full opening, when it possesses four times greater rapidity than the above wide-angle Rectilinear, and about twice that of the Triple Achromatic, or the Petzval Orthoscopic, Orthographic, &c. Lenses. It is therefore invaluable for dimly-lighted interiors, and for all kinds of quick outdoor pho-

tography—i. e. for instantaneous effects, groups, landscapes, &c. The image produced by this iens is absolutely free from distortion, and, on account of the comparatively small diameters of lenses used in its construction, the resulting picture is free from all flare, or central spot.

#### DIMENSIONS AND PRICES.

Each lens is supplied with a set of Waterhouse's diaphragms. (Observe! The apertures of stops are too large to admit of being made in the form of a rotating diaphragm plate, as supplied with the "wide-angle" Rectilinear.) The respective sizes of views, and the focal lengths of lenses named below are the same as those recorded under the heading "Triple Achromatic Lens," this being a well-approved proportion of size of picture and focal length of lens; but, if required, each lens, marked below, with smaller stops, can be used for the next size larger view.

By removing (unscrewing) the central lens, and using the front and back combinations only, the back focus is shortened by about one-half; the time of exposure is now nearly the same as with the ordinary portrait lens, but the curvature of field is greater, and therefore it should only be used for Vignette heads or the like.

The patent portrait combinations, A, B and C, and the patent portrait and group lenses, D, are all supplied with a full set of the Waterhouse central diaphragms, in morocco case; so, also, are the new patent Stereographic and Triple Achromatic and Rapid Rectilinear lenses.

The Wide Angle Landscape, Quick Acting Stereoscopic and the Wide Angle Rectilinear Lenses, are all provided with "rotating" diaphragms. For further particulars, send for a catalogue of the Dallmeyer lenses.



The bed of the camera is telescopic, and is moved by an endless screw. The double swing-back is composed of Nelson Wright's Patent Metallic Support for the vertical swing, and the thumb-screws, which fasten the camera-box to the bed, form the second or lateral swing. The front board is attached to the bellows with thumb-screws,

and the whole supported by metallic braces fastened to the bed. When packed for travelling the braces are unshipped, the bellows loosened, and the entire front and back removed from the bed, when all can be packed in small compass. From the mode of putting together, this box is more rigid than any other, and is so simple as to preclude all possibility of getting out of order. practicable by two illustrations only. We will, therefore, enumerate them.

First. For medallions or vignettes not requiring arm rest, the circular arm, as seen in fig. 1, can be removed, leaving head rest and back support, which can be readily adjusted to any position.

Second. With the circular arm, as seen in fig. 1, the chair is adapted to all sitting positions. The arm can be elevated or lowered, or moved from right to left without disturbing chair or subjects. This arrangement is also admirably suited for kneeling postures of children and misses. By using the semi-circular head rest attachment, as seen in fig. 2, groups may be posed, giving a head rest to two subjects.


Third. Either one or both of the side arms in fig. 2 may be removed, and the back elevated to suit the subject, and with the semicircular head rest attachment, any position can be made, either sitting or standing, within an angle of 120°. The arm which carries the head rest may, after turning one serew, be moved either to right or left, and firmly fastened at any point within an angle of 90°. It can also be extended for use with the high back. Without the latter the extension need not be used. By means of universal joints, the rest can be adjusted with one turn of screw to any desired position. The chair is made in the most elegant and substantial manner, and the frame-work, which is of iron, is finely fitted, and those parts in wood are richly

carved, panelled, engraved, and firmly attached by screws. The rods are of finely fitted and polished tubing, nickle plated, and the upholstering is of the best class. We shall keep in stock two qualities viz:—

The Bowdish chair will soon find its way into every studio of consequence in the country. It has all the advantages any one chair could have, and it presents a very pleasing and attractive appearance.
